The Laurel Lake Association was formed in the Spring of 1950. It's first major task was to find a boat launching site, to prevent a taking by the state. As you all know, the public now has a way to get on and off from the lake. This move kept the control in the hands of the town.

By 1987, our membership was at a low of fifty members. With the need for a way to get information to the users of the lake, both residents and visitors, an effort to increase our membership was undertaken. We ended the year with one hundred and sixty-nine members. Due to the unusual weather this year, not as many people were contacted and we are at one hundred fifty-eight as of this publication.

The Board of Directors decided to keep the dues at the 1950 level to encourage all members in a family to join and hold their own membership. Even occasional visitors should have memberships. It is important that anyone who wants to preserve Laurel Lake should be members. Everyone should know what is going on with the Lake and how they can help us keep it alive. The most memberships held in one household is nine; some households had seven, and many households, five.

It was a close race until the boats approached the second marker. The race was shortened just before the boats passed the second marker due to the absence of any breeze at all. It was soon after the decision to shorten the race that Michael Friedman caught a gust of wind that put him far ahead of the others. Michael Friedman, the youngest racer at age 12, came in first, followed by Dave Dewhurst in second. Bill and Aaron Samuels came in third.

The Sunfish Regatta was started in 1988 with a suggestion by Don Garland. The race is for Sunfish mainly because of the number of them on the lake. Next years race will be a little different. Hopefully there will be a strong and steady wind. Also, there will be a nominal fee charged to the entrants to cover the cost of the trophies. The scheduled day for next year's race will be the day before Labor Day, thereby giving us Labor Day as a backup day in the event the race has to be postponed for any reason. Of course, there will be another finish line party where the trophies will be presented to the first three boats who cross the finish line.

Analysis of membership

Presently there are 157 Memberships in the Laurel Lake Association. 49% of the membership comes from Massachusetts. 27% comes from New Hampshire. The other 24% come from Connecticut, Florida, Arizona, Maine, Vermont, Rhode Island, Michigan, California, Texas, Pennsylvania, Delaware, North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia. 17 members appear to live in Fitzwilliam year round.

Letter to the Editor:

Dear Larry:

Thank you for your letter about the Ledger. As a consequence of it, I have had an interesting time thinking back about Fitzwilliam and how it has changed - and stayed the same - during my lifetime. Not sure any of this will be helpful, nor even interesting to you, but I'll run on for a bit.

When I went to that annual meeting, I was not interested specifically in being an officer in the "Lake" Association. I am, however, interested in what happens to the lake and not at all unhappy that things worked out as they did. I have lived at Laurel Lake every summer since birth - Aug 1935 - excepting to wherein I was serving on active duty in the Air Force. My family goes back in Fitzwilliam to just before the original charter was granted by King George III in 1772 - the year of the "Tea Party". It was my father's home town and my family has come to love it as he did in his 85+ years there. I read a description of the lake in the 1888 History of Fitzwilliam - "a picturesque sheet of water embowed among the hills, with the grand old Monadnock towering in the distance". Things in that sense have not changed much and I would like to see things "not change" too much more! The lake is a unique asset that we all appreciate in our own ways. We must start to learn how and what to do to protect it however, or my grand-daughter, who is the 6th generation in my family to have lived in Fitzwilliam, will not have the lake to enjoy. Its pretty common knowledge what happens to lakes and what we can do to prevent their destruction. I hope that the Lake Association can be a mechanism of information and assistance in helping us all to keep Fitzwilliam and the Lake the way we all want it to be. I know it can be, and I think that message, along with a plea for 100% membership, should be our initial emphasis.



A report from the President


I am delighted to have been selected President of the Laurel Lake Association and I would like to take a moment to share some thoughts I have about the next two years.




